Coronation Celebrations

Coronation Service and Leave

Coronation weekend was marked by leave from Saturday noon till Tuesday evening. Prior to the beginning of the leave, however, a service, according to the form advised by the Archbishop of Canterbury, was conducted by the school Chaplain, Canon Capon. Most boys were able to get home for the holiday, and many of those whose homes were too far distant to allow a visit were hospitably entertained by friends whose homes were conveniently nearer.

Visit of Lady Mary Baring

On Thursday of Coronation Week a delightful ceremony was held in the School Hall when Lady Mary Baring visited the school to present Coronation medals and mugs. She was accompanied by the Acting Director of Education, Mr. B. A. Astley, and, after inspecting a Guard of Honour of the C.C.F. under Major W. J. H. Liversidge, was introduced to the School by the Acting Headmaster, Lt. Col. J. R. Forrest. Lady Mary spoke to us and gave us a Coronation message from His Excellency the Governor before presenting the mementoes of the occasion. After the ceremony, Mr. Chadwick and Major Liversidge conducted Lady Baring round the exhibition of books and coins on show in the Library.

Coronation Film

Work was again very pleasantly interrupted on the morning of 17th June when arrangements were made for the school to visit the Capitol Theatre to see the very impressive Coronation Film, "A Queen is Crowned." The African Staff of the school had an opportunity later of seeing this film, and the Compound has since been full of excitement and "mzuri sana."

Coronation Exhibition

On the two days immediately after the Coronation holiday, the School had the opportunity of seeing a small exhibition relevant to the occasion. Mr. Chadwick and Mr. Liversidge had organised this in the Library.

Books and coins were on view and these placed particular emphasis on the first Elizabethan age. In addition, there were original Tudor documents and medals struck to commemorate the defeat of the Armada. There were books printed during the reign of Elizabeth I, 17th century publications of memoirs of her reign and a number of modern books dealing with the period. The coins were representative of almost every sovereign from 1558 to 1953, and there was a complete set of the new coinage and a Coronation crown piece.

School Notes

Barbed wire fences have been erected as a security precaution round our two "temporary" wooden dormitories at Junior and Intermediate Houses, and formidable barricades close Entrances B and C after sun-down. In addition to the usual night watchmen, a fully armed askari force patrols the Compound day and night, with further help from Staff patrols during the hours of darkness.

We congratulate J. D. M. Silvester who has enhanced his distinguished school career by being awarded a Rhodes Scholarship. Our best wishes go with him when he enters Iesus College, Oxford, next term.

At the end of term Staff Meeting in April, the Headmaster handed over the gift of a gentleman's dressing case with the best wishes of the staff to Mr. David Anderson, on the occasion of his retirement from teaching.

Twelfth Night

"Twelfth Night" has been described as the pearl of English Romantic Comedy. It is certainly that. It is also a very happy play, and the Dramatic Society are to be congratulated on such a suitable choice for a happy Coronation Year, quite apart from the the fact that we have not had the pleasure of seeing Shakespearian Comedy performed at the school before.

The permanent set, constructed and painted by R. McLellan Sim, a simple and dignified affair of steps and arches, was a very suitable background to the piece, and the Producer, Peter Cobb, made good use of it for effective groupings, entrances and exits. It also left the stage refreshingly clear, must have been a god-send to the Stage Manager, and did much to capture as near as possible a genuine Elizabethan flavour.

It is impossible, and indeed, unnecessary, to mention every member of the total cast of 27. Jesse Allen, as Malvolio, naturally stole the thunder. He put plenty of zest into his part, but he will soon learn not to spoil his performance by a tendency to over-act. Malvolio, besides being a "geck & gull," is also a very dependable steward. Does not Olivia remark that she would not have him miscarry for the half of her dowry? Michael Davis, as that jolly vulgarian, Sir Toby Belch, gave a robust performance, and when he had settled down, deservedly afforded the audience a great deal of amusement, while Michael Riegels portrayed the foolish Sir Andrew Aguecheek with a great deal of sympathetic understanding. A refreshingly lively and energetic performance was given by Neville Jones in the difficult role of Feste, the Clown. But we knew he could act before. One of the very best performances was that given by Nigel Brown, whose Maria was excellently done, if only for good facial expression, no unnecessary waving of arms and a very pleasing speaking voice. He might have brought out more forcibly the essential roguery and high spirits in her character, for she has an exquisite sense of humour, otherwise she could never have married Sir Toby. Viola spoke well, but must learn to act, and Olivia was so long unfreezing, if indeed she ever did completely thaw, that I thought she had joined Patience on her Monument and was never coming down. David Shelton, as Fabian, had moments, and showed that there is distinct promise in him. Tom Peal, in the difficult part of the Renaissance lover, Orsino, acted with impressive sincerity, and spoke up well.

So many people's hard work had gone into this production that it is almost invidious to single out individuals, but Trudi Cobb and Molly Liversidge deserve much credit for the very remarkable costumes which, I understand, they contrived from almost nothing, while G. C. Knight proved himself to be a skilful make-up artist. And finally, to Peter Cobb, who spent so many patient hours training the actors, I would say, in the words of Sir Andrew, "Excellent good, i'faith." It was a jolly good first try, and I hope he will try again.



The bird section still has the largest number of enthusiasts. We are honoured to have amongst us a Member of the British Ornithological Union, A. D. Forbes-Watson, although at the moment he is helping J. W. Winter to identify a large number of skulls.

We regret the loss of E. J. Lugard, who put a great deal of work into the Grass Section, the collection and identification of which is being continued by R. A. B. Burn.


Chapel Notes

Since the last Chapel Notes were written, a change has been made in the arrangement of the east end of the Hall. The erection of the War Memorial Tablets in the Apse—these have still to be dedicated—made it necessary to remove the lecterns. In their old position they would have made the Tablets invisible to most of the School. So two small platforms have been experimentally erected outside the Apse. This improves the acoustics, especially as the choir and piano are also now at the east end. We shall hope soon to overcome the slight snags that still remain in the way of neat finish for curtains, carpets and other details. The comfort of those attending Communion services has been greatly increased through the kindness of Mrs. Liversidge. During her recent visit here she herself made and presented to the School an ample number of hassocks. They have been much appreciated by all who have endured kneeling on the concrete floor.

Our thanks are due to a number of visiting preachers. It was a happy thing that the Rev. J. Gillett, the School's first Chaplain, was able to preach his "farewell" sermon to the School. For the time being, he has settled into parish work in England, but the Gilletts' friends anticipate that they will be back in Kenya before many years are past. The Moderator of the Church of Scotland in Kenya, the Rev. R. G. M. Calderwood, visited us for the first time, and we were glad also to welcome General Sir Arthur Smith. His soldierly sermon was strong in the tradition of Christian leadership in the British Army. The service of Easter carols made a fitting conclusion to the Lent term.





Hockey

A good deal of Hockey was compressed into a short term, and although the 1st XI standard was again not as high as we would have liked, most of our matches were thoroughly enjoyable. A feature of the season was the increased number of inter-school games. We were more successful in these fixtures, though we could draw only twice—with the Duke of York School. The 2nd XI and Senior Colts had better fortune. Both our leading XI's failed to get a win against an adult club. The Ist XI played weakly against Parklands in the Craig Cup, and were easily defeated. They lost the initiative at the start, stayed on their heels, and never looked like regaining it. The 2nd XI showed more spirit against Vagabonds, and, could they have taken their chances, might have won. Generally, our defensive and midfield play was sound, but in neither XI did we find a satisfactory forward line, despite various changes of players and positions. Of course, only two members of last year's XXII had returned, and new and inexperienced teams were formed. The unbeaten Senior Colts were captained by A. Swan, who played occasionally and well in the 1st XI. They played good hockey, and encouraged us to hope for a stronger XXII next year.

A. B. Figenschou was appointed Captain of Hockey, but resigned at midterm due to ill-health. He was succeeded by T. C. K. Brown, T. B. Clegg in goal, played very well until March, when he began to make an increasing number of mistakes. The backs, B. U. Kaufmann (Colours 1953) and T. C. K. Brown (Colours 1953), combined steadily and defended consistently, giving opposing forwards few chances to shoot. Kaufmann's anticipation and tackling were good, and he broke up many dangerous attacks. The wing halves were A. S. Maxwell (Colours 1953) and N. J. Jones. Their marking was tight, and they backed up their forwards well. G. T. Mowat, formerly a left inner, moved to centre half, and was just getting used to his new position when he fell ill, and was off games for nearly half the season. He had a good eye, and was quick on his feet and determined. Unfortunately, his place was never satisfactorily filled, though M. I. van der Westhuyzen did his best in it. A. B. Figenschou (Colours 1953) was a fairly fast right wing, but rather lacked the knack of creating openings. M. J. Leete (Colours 1953) was the most consistent forward. He had good stickwork, passed the ball unselfishly, and was ready to go for the goal. J. G. Bell, although he played on the left wing for some time, proved the most successful of several players, including M. A. K. Woods, who played at centre forward. B. Kalogeris, left inner, scored several goals by following up, but played the ball rather at arm's length, and showed up better in House matches than in School games. P. B. Powles was a fast, though not very skilful left wing who always showed great determination and dash.

The 2nd XI, captained by J. W. Winter, had a fairly successful season. They also were stronger in the defence than in the forward line, although in one match they ran riot and took all their chances. M. S. Davis, right back, played with great enthusiasm, and, if he was occasionally impetuous, was a stout defender. Winter at centre half marked well, and played hard and

teadily throughout the season. J. Georgulas, who played several times for the 1st XI, showed good stickwork. A. W. Stewart also played in the 1st XI while Figenschou was sick.

Scott won the Inter-House competition. Their Ist XI played some delightfully open hockey in the House matches, and their other teams were consistently successful. Nicholson, whose Juniors were outstanding, scoring 114½ out of 130 points, were close runners-up. In November, S. Shalg, J. A. A. Kleynhans and G. B. Brooks played for the Combined Schools against the Tata Sports Club XI, and on February 26th Kaufmann and Clegg were in the Combined Schools XI against Pakistan Rovers. We are grateful to Mr. Knight for coaching the Ist XXII and Senior Colts and umpiring their matches, and to all the Staff who umpired House matches. We regret that the Staff were unable to play the Duke of York School Staff this year, as we had looked to them to repeat their success of 1952.

Boxing-1953

Last year boxing was almost forgotten, mainly because we had no instructor and no Inter-House Competition. In January, however, Q.M.S.I. Spinner, A.P.T.C., resumed his position as instructor, and an Inter-House Competition was held in March.

Most houses managed to enter a competitor in each weight, and some very good bouts were seen; although skill was often lacking, plenty of action and pluck were displayed.

A notable point about the competition was the fact that 15 of the 31 quarter and semi-final bouts ended inside the distance, but every final went the full three rounds.

Two new A.B.A. rules were introduced, and we saw the referee officiating inside the ring and heard the audible count.

R. P. Metcalfe (Clive) won the Fenton Cup for the most effective style. M. A. K. Woods (Hawke) put up a very gallant display, showing plenty of aggression against a bigger, heavier, and stronger opponent, and won the Best Loser's medal.

Hawke and Grigg tied for first place with 28 points each, and jointly hold the Ruben Cup. Rhodes and Nicholson, the previous holders, were runners-up with 26 points each, followed by Clive with 23 and Scott with 21.

The results of the finals were as follows:

Midgeweight: R. P. Metcalfe (C) beat P. H. C. Moolman (R) on points.

Both boxers had a sound knowledge of the game and displayed some clever tactics. Metcalfe was the more aggressive of the pair and this probably enabled him to earn the decision, as the fight was very close and Moolman was countering very cleverly.

Mosquitoweight: R. B. O'Meara (G) beat L. A. Tessaro (C) on points.

The first round started with both boxers rushing each other and throwing punches from all angles, but doing little damage. In the second and third rounds, O'Meara was content to let Tessaro do the attacking, while he kept him out of range with his straight lefts and steadily piled up points. Tessaro worked hard and always fought back.

Flyweight: W. Wainey (S) won on a walk-over from R. E. Stewart-Wynne (H). Bantamweight: G. Kuchar (G) beat A. Mongardi (R) on points.

This bout was rather disappointing, as Kuchar was obviously going for a knock-out and, rather than box, rushed wildly at Mongardi trying to hook furiously, but Mongardi blocked these punches quite effectively. Mongardi did well against a very much stronger opponent, and managed to keep going until the last bell, in spite of being floored 18 times.

Featherweight: N. T. Millar (N) beat P. S. L. Griffiths (R) on points.

Griffiths displayed a good defence against Millar's aggressive attack, but did very little attacking himself. Millar boxed well and picked his punches carefully against an opponent who was continuously on the defensive.

Lightweight: R. Buckle (C) beat B. P. Gemmel (S) on points.

Buckle attacked right from the opening bell, and set up a fair lead. Gemmel, however, was by no means outclassed and often met an attack from Buckle with a very effective left counter. In the second round Gemmel took a lot of punishment, and Buckle built up a good points lead.

Welterweight: A. L. C. Green (H) won on a walk-over from E. J. B. Lindsell (R)

Lindsell was forced to scratch owing to a fractured thumb sustained in the semi-finals.

Middleweight: M. S. Keese (N) beat M. A. K. Woods (H) on points.

Each boxer realised that he was facing an opponent with a heavy punch and started very cautiously, but they soon warmed up and scored with several hard blows. In the second round, Keese began to show more aggression and landed a very heavy right hook to the lower ribs, which shook Woods and might have ended the bout if he had followed up quickly. Both were very fit and maintained an attack throughout the last round.

Catchweight: S. P. K. Wheeler (N) beat P. L. Lloyd-Parker (G) on points. Wheeler began cautiously against an opponent who had a considerable advantage in age, height and weight and carried a heavy punch in both fists. In the second round, however, Wheeler found that he was able to score freely and, with added confidence, began to build up a big points lead by landing heavy left hooks and straight rights. In the last round Lloyd-Parker slowed up after trying to land a knock-out blow, and Wheeler consolidated his lead.

Atomicweight: (Special contest: No points awarded.) Steele (G) beat Verlaque (H) on points. Enslin (C) beat van Rensburg (S) on points.


Tennis

At present an Inter-House Tennis Competition is being considered, and it is hoped that it will be held next term.




